Founding of the LWV

- February 14, 1920: LWV was founded by Carrie Chapman Catt during the convention of the National American Woman Suffrage Association
- August 18, 1920: Six months later, the 19th Amendment was ratified, giving women the right to vote
- From the beginning, the League has been an activist, grassroots, nonpartisan organization






Who we are

Nonpartisanship



- Nonpartisan, but Political
- We do not support or oppose political candidates or parties
- Allows the League to advocate based on issues, not political parties
- We study issues, develop positions, and advocate for/against public policies



What We Do

EMPOWER VOTERS

 We empower voters to exercise their right to vote by holding voter registration drives, sponsoring candidate forums/debates, and educating the public about their rights on Election Day.

PROTECT THE RIGHT TO VOTE

• We protect everyone's right to vote against threats and ensure that every vote is counted by fighting for and implementing voting systems that are free, fair, and accessible.

FOSTER CIVIL DIALOGUE

 We foster civil nonpartisan dialogue among voters, government, politicians, & subject matter experts about important community issues, such as government spending, climate change, immigration, & civil liberties.

Voter Services

- We serve voters by:
 - Protecting their right to vote
 - Registering people to vote
 - Informing voters on the voting process
 - Informing voters about issues and candidates on the ballot
 - And more!

Advocacy

- For an issue of concern, we:
 - Research the facts
 - Compare to our policy positions
 - Determine if we can/should support or oppose the issue
 - Board approves a statement and who will provide statement
 - And more!

Civility & Civil Discourse

- What is Civility and Civil Discourse?
 - Engaging in discussion with the goal of listening, not responding
 - Participating in conversations where you may disagree on ideas
 - Civil Discourse does not mean shutting down differing opinions
- Civility ≠ Tone Policing
 - Focus on the ideas, not personal characteristics
 - It's okay to be passionate about your position
- Good faith effort to engage
 - It's okay to disagree

Voter Services Leadership Needs

High School Voter Registration

- a. organizes and coordinates with high school leadership, educators and election officials to
- b. facilitate mock elections and registration drives in area high schools
- c. assists students aged 17.5 years and up in voter registration
- d. monitors voter registration eligibility of student participants
- e. submits student voter registration forms to County Registrar
- f. conducts follow-up correspondence with students via election reminders and encourages voting
- g. oversees volunteer activities
- h. maintains detailed records

Voter Rights Restoration

- a. organizes and facilitates rights restoration outreach and services to felony disenfranchised citizens
- b. activities may include coordination and partnership with local, state and national advocates to advance voter rights restoration efforts, education, legislation and outreach
- c. educates and assists in the CERV application and process
- d. monitors and follows up with correspondence relating to status of CERV applications
- e. engages with legal advisors to assist applicants with CERV application issues and questions
- f. utilizes the Alacourt system to verify potential CERV eligibility
- g. maintains potentially sensitive information records and privacy

About Observer Corps

What is Observer Corps?

- A structured way for individuals to exercise their right to know what is going on.
- Informs citizens of the decisions impacting their lives.
- Promotes government transparency and accountability.
- Connects elected/appointed officials with their constituents.
- Identifies areas where action or improvement is needed.

What else?

- Initially, we will observe Huntsville City Council, with plans to observe more later down the road.
- There will be training.
- It is flexible.

We want to start ASAP: We need observers



Other immediate ways to get involved

- Advocacy: we need you to take action when requested
- Education: we need planning and coordination
- Fundraising: we need a lead...
- Publicity & Communications: we need web site, social media, publications, and video help
- Membership Engagement: we need help with social events, member onboarding, etc.




Leadership
